# Annual Report

UCI Police Department Policy #905 “Military Equipment” requires an annual report to be submitted to the Regents on an annual basis and posted on the police department website for as long as the equipment is in use.

Upon approval of a military equipment policy, the Chief of Police or the authorized designee should submit a military equipment report to the governing body of each type of military equipment approved within one year of approval and annually thereafter for as long as the military equipment is available for use (Government Code § 7072).

The Chief of Police or the authorized designee should also make each annual military equipment report publicly available on the Department website for as long as the military equipment is available for use. The report shall include all information required for the preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment in the Department inventory (Government Code § 7072).

The annual military equipment report shall, at a minimum, include the following information for the immediately preceding calendar year for each type of military equipment:

- A summary of how the military equipment was used and the purpose of its use.
- A summary of any complaints or concerns received concerning military equipment.
- The results of any internal audits, any information about violations of the military equipment use policy, and any actions taken in response.
- The total annual cost of each type of military equipment, including acquisition, personnel training, transportation, maintenance, storage, upgrade, and other ongoing costs, and from what source funds will be provided for the military equipment in the calendar year following submission of the annual military equipment report.
- The quantity possessed for each type of military equipment.
- If the law enforcement agency intends to acquire additional military equipment in the next year, the quantity sought for each type of military equipment.



## A. Usage and Purpose of Use

UCIPD used (100) 40mm eXact iMPact munitions and (300) FN Herstal 303 less-lethal projectiles for police officer firearms training/certifications this year.

UCIPD used 2,500 rounds of 5.56mm-duty rifle ammunition and 9, 200 rounds of 5.56mm-range ammunition for police officer firearms training/certifications this year.

## B. Complaints or Concerns

UCIPD received one complaint after the publication of last year's annual report, following the public AB481 meeting held on August 28, 2024. The 2024 annual report was subsequently updated to include the complaint.

## C. Internal Audits

An equipment audit was conducted and there were no violations of policy.

## D. Total Costs and Funding Source

UCIPD purchased ammunition totaling the cost of \$7,576.12 from the department's annual budget.

## F. Request for New Military Equipment

UCIPD requests (1) Long-Range Acoustic Device (LRAD) to provide evacuation and dispersal directions at more than one location (UCI Campus and UCI Medical Centers) , (5) Pepperball Launchers, (1,000) Pepperball PAVA Projectiles, (500) Pepperball Paint Marking Projectiles, and (35) additional 40mm rounds for SRT.
